

Monarch Butterfly Waystation

This site is certified by Monarch Watch as a Certified Monarch Waystation #19376. It was created because the monarch butterfly population is on the decline – nearly 90% of monarchs have disappeared since 1990.

If we start conservation now, there is a strong chance we can stem the decline.



What is this?

Texas is on the monarch butterfly migration path between the northern US and Canada and their overwintering site in central Mexico. This native flower garden will support the monarch on its journey as well as provide habitat for other pollinators.

How does it help?

Native plants and flowers attract butterflies and help pollinators stay healthy. In addition to nectar from flowers, monarchs need milkweed to survive.

What can you do?

You can help by planting a pollinator garden – in your yard, school, church, business or even in a pot!

In 2018, The Woodlands Township was designated a Monarch Champion City by the National Wildlife Federation.
